For ages, havelis in Rajasthan were the abode of nobility. Here, gracious hospitality was a way of life and deep rooted traditions were an inherent part of royal lifestyles. Fateh Bagh, Ranakpur- Hotel Fateh Bagh, Ranakpur is no ordinary palace hotel. 


